About the Institute

- Established in 1988.
- A national center of legal excellence that prepares candidates for judicial positions through a diploma program.
- Offers advanced training for judges and justice sector workers both locally and internationally.

Mission, Vision, and Values

- **Mission:** Enhance justice sector performance through the qualification of candidates, judges, and justice personnel, while conducting legal research and studies.
- Vision: Excellence in achieving justice.
- **Core Values:** Independence, neutrality, integrity, accountability, respect, innovation and excellence, effective partnership, equality, professionalism, transparency.

Strategic Goals

- 1. Qualify individuals for judicial positions and enhance judges' competence.
- 2. Enhance skills of public sector employees.

Legal Framework

- Operates under Judicial Institute Regulation No. (49) of 2020 and Administrative Organization Regulation No. (22) of 2021.
- Internal regulations include guidelines for conduct, acceptance of non-Jordanian candidates, certificate issuance, training fees, etc.

Organizational Structure

The organizational structure of the Jordanian Judicial Institute reflects a comprehensive institutional framework within the judiciary. Key components include:

- Judicial Authority: Encompassing courts, the public prosecution, and internal oversight units.
- Administrative and Technical Bodies: Supporting the operations of the Judicial Council.
- Judicial Council: Oversees the broader structure and direction.
- Board of Directors: The governing body of the Institute, including:
 - The President of the Judicial Council (Chairman)
 - The President of the High Administrative Court (Vice Chairman)

- The Chief Public Prosecutor
- The Chief Inspector of Courts
- The Secretary General of the Ministry of Labor
- The Director General of the Judicial Institute
- Two judges of special rank or higher
- Two faculty members from public law schools in Jordan

Duties of the Board of Directors:

- Formulating the general policy of the Institute.
- Approving plans related to the organization of the Institute's affairs and supervising their implementation.
- Recommending to the Judicial Council the holding of continuous training courses, seminars, and workshops for judges.
- Approving the nomination of part-time lecturers as recommended by the Scientific Committee.
- Approving the study curricula for the Judicial Institute's diploma and other qualification programs, based on the recommendation of the Scientific Committee.
- Establishing the rules and criteria for selecting the approved number of candidates for admission to the Judicial Institute diploma program, in coordination with the Judicial Council.
- Determining the start and end dates of the academic year for any of the training programs offered by the Institute, including semesters, their schedules, vacations (semester and annual), and study/work hours.
- Establishing examination regulations, including setting dates, methods of administration, and monitoring procedures.
- Approving examination results.
- Approving the fees for training programs offered by the Institute, based on the recommendations of the Scientific Committee.
- Determining the compensation and wages paid for teaching or training, in accordance with regulations issued for this purpose.
- Issuing regulations governing student conduct, disciplinary procedures, and applicable disciplinary sanctions.

Duties of the Scientific Committee:

- Recommending the scientific standards and criteria for selecting faculty members.
- Recommending the names of part-time lecturers to work at the Institute.
- Preparing curricula and study plans for the Judicial Institute diploma program.
- Proposing continuous training courses, seminars, and workshops.
- Establishing criteria for evaluating faculty members.
- Seeking the assistance of experts and specialists for the purpose of developing plans and detailing the content of study curricula and programs offered by the Institute.

Judicial Diploma Program

<u>Admission Requirements for the Judicial Institute Diploma Program:</u>

- Jordanian nationality, under 35 years old.
- Clean legal and ethical record.
- A law degree with minimum GPA of "Good", or equivalent qualifications as detailed.
- The applicant must have achieved a minimum average of 70% in the General Secondary Education Certificate (Tawjihi) in the scientific, literary, or information management stream, or an equivalent qualification. In addition, the applicant must meet one of the following conditions:
- Hold a bachelor's degree in law with a minimum grade of "Good" from a faculty of law at a Jordanian university, or an equivalent law degree from a recognized faculty of law abroad, provided the study was on a full-time basis and the degree is recognized for judicial appointments in the country where it was awarded;

OR

Be a licensed practicing lawyer ("ustadh lawyer");

OR

- Have served in a first-category position in the Ministry of Justice or the General Secretariat of the Judicial Council for:
- Three years after obtaining the bachelor's degree in law;

- Two years after obtaining a master's degree in law;
- One year after obtaining a doctorate in law.
- The applicant may also be eligible if they are nominated (sponsored) and hold either a bachelor's or master's degree in law, in accordance with the Scientific Scholarships Regulation of the Ministry of Justice.
- The applicant must be among the top ten graduates of their class in the academic year of graduation from a faculty of law at a Jordanian university, within the last three years from the date of the admission competition announcement.
- The applicant must not have been previously expelled from the Institute for any reason, nor have failed the admission exam three times.
- The applicant must pass the admission competition held by the Admission Competition Committee, as stipulated in Article (11) of the Institute's regulations.

Curriculum:

- 33 courses over two academic years.
- The academic year for the diploma program consists of three semesters, each with a duration of 16 weeks:
- Two academic semesters are dedicated to courses and study materials (subjects and modules).
- The third semester is a practical training semester, which includes:
- Apprenticeship-style learning (shadowing judges) at magistrate courts.
- Mock trials (simulated court proceedings).
- Classroom discussion sessions (interactive legal discussions).
- Field visits to institutions related to the judicial field.

Training Methodology

- Based on real needs of judges and legal professionals.
- Utilizes modern frameworks like Bloom's Taxonomy and McCarthy model.
- Scientific committee validates training content.
- Continuous quality measurement (e.g., Kirkpatrick model).

Library and Digital Resources

- Over 17,000 legal books and digital materials.
- Legal databases: Qistas, Maarefah, Adalah, Qararuk.
- MARC 21 indexing system.
- Digital rights management for content access.

Faculty Selection Criteria

• Minimum years of legal or academic experience depending on degree level.

- Includes judges, academics, lawyers, and domain experts.
- Evaluated using a 200-point scale; minimum 120 required for appointment.

Competitions and Additional Programs

In Addition to the Diploma Admission Competitions, the Judicial Institute Also Organizes the Following Legal and Judicial Competitions:

- Judicial Police Competition for legal officers from the Public Security Directorate.
- Customs Public Prosecution Competition for legal professionals at the Jordan Customs Department.
- Legal Advisor Competition for the Ministry of Labor.
- Judiciary and Public Prosecution Competition for the Civil Defense Directorate.
- Military Judiciary Competition.
- Judicial Competition for the Gendarmerie Forces.
- Competitive Mock Trial Competitions for law students, organized in collaboration with primary and secondary partners.

<u>Standards and Criteria for Selecting and Evaluating Faculty Members at the Judicial</u> Institute:

Eligible candidates for teaching positions at the Judicial Institute include:

- 1. Judges of the regular courts, whether currently serving or retired, who have completed at least:
 - 15 years of judicial service, or
 - 12 years if holding a Master's degree in law, or
 - 10 years if holding a PhD in law.
- 2. Faculty members from Jordanian universities, provided that:
 - Their academic rank is at least Associate Professor.
 - Former university faculty members may also be appointed.

- 3. Licensed senior lawyers ("ustadh" lawyers) with no less than 15 years of legal practice.
 - A combination of judicial and legal practice experience may be counted toward this requirement.
- 4. Visiting Arab and foreign judges and university professors from Arab and international institutions.
- 5. Specialist lecturers in technical fields relevant to student training, provided they have at least 5 years of professional experience in their area of specialization.

Additionally:

- A training quality measurement methodology and a faculty selection evaluation system are applied.
- A point-based evaluation is used, with a minimum of 120 out of 200 points required for acceptance as a first-time or returning lecturer.
